Feel free to use the existing text herein to communicate with your clients, making sure to modify each example to correspond to the services, technologies, opinions, and needs of your practice.

Design examples, including post cards and newspaper ads, can be modified and customized in Adobe InDesign. Talk with your consultant about how to best implement the design examples shown in this packet. Most often, a third-party design/printing service will be required to offer design customization and printing services.

- Position your practice as the go-to source for veterinary information by distributing flyers or newsletter articles highlighting the most important facts about dental health and periodontal disease in animals.
- Promote your practice's retail section by highlighting dental health products (tooth brushes, toothpaste, dental treats, chew toys, bones, etc.) on your website and social media pages. Offer special discounts during National Pet Dental Health Month (February).
- Display informational posters in exam rooms or at the front desk that educate clients about proper dental care. Include one or two tips (i.e. how to best brush their dog's teeth) that clients can commit to memory and put into practice when they get home.
- Hand out brochures in the office, or send an email to clients stressing the importance of dental health upkeep. Include information about the symptoms of periodontal disease and what clients should do if they think their pet might need a professional cleaning.
- For pet owners interested in making an appointment to get their pet's teeth cleaned, provide a brochure or flyer explaining what they need to know about the procedure, i.e., what to do before and after anesthesia, how long it takes, how long until they should feed their pet, etc.
- Create shareable info-graphics for your social media sites that offer simple tips for keeping pets' teeth and gums clean at home.
- Include a section on your website with facts and/or frequently asked questions regarding canine and feline oral health.





For pets two years and older, consider scheduling regular cleanings with your vet. These cleanings typically require your pet to undergo anesthesia, but once the cleaning is done, your pet should be up and active in about fifteen minutes.


